



Hidden away

Introducing new knowledge or recalling knowledge

This activity will help your learners answer questions in a fun way, which will help them focus.

preparation

- Pick the image of an animal or a scene that is relevant to your lesson and fix it on the wall (an A3 picture would be ideal for all to see).
- Fix different boxes that can be removed independently on top of that picture. They need to cover the whole picture.
- Number those boxes (one number per box).
- Each number corresponds to a question, which you will have with you, on a piece of paper.
- You could laminate this resource (put see-through plastic over the paper) so that it can be used again and again.

procedure

- Let your learners know that a picture is hidden behind all the numbers that they can see on the board.
- The aim of the game is to work out what the picture represents.
- To reveal parts of the picture, the learners need to pick a number and to answer its corresponding question correctly.
- Learners need to answer questions to reveal as much of the picture as possible.

- The first learner who guesses what the picture represents wins.
- Link the picture to your learning objective and to the new knowledge that needs to be imparted to your learners.

Question 12: Name one thing you can do to help animals.

Question 13: Name one thing you can do to keep a nice environment.

Question 14: What gives plants the energy they need to grow?

Question 15: Name one kind way to look after an animal.

Question 16: How would you prevent elephants from going somewhere?

Question 17: What should you do if you come across a stray dog?

Question 18: How would you ensure that your pet is happy?

Question 19: Name an animal who can live on land and in the water.

Question 20: Name one reason why mice are useful.

Question 21: Name one reason why snakes are useful.

Question 22: How could you make your donkey move forward without stressing it?

Question 23: How could you get people to understand that animals have feelings?

Question 24: Name one useful animal around where you live.

Question 25: What is the biggest animal you have ever seen?
